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A DAILY EXAMEN ON JOY

The examen is a daily reflection created by St. Ignatius Loyola that invites a person to examine their day - looking intentionally for where they found God and where God was more difficult to find. Consider praying this Examen daily during week #3 of the Advent Season.

I spend a moment quieting myself, inviting the holy Spirit to help me examine my day.

I look back on my day since I woke up. What moments in my day brought me joy?

I pause in gratitude to celebrate with God these tangible moments of joy.

When was it hard for me to feel joy today?

I ask God for forgiveness for any of my reactions today that might have lessened the joy of others.

I look towards the rest of my day (or tomorrow). What do I need from God in order to experience a renewed sense of joy?

I pause to ask God for what I need.

Lord, as I end this examen, help me to see that the nearer I come to You and the person You created me to be, the more my heart will be filled with joy.

A DAILY REFLECTION ON SCRIPTURE

Quotes are chosen from the daily Scripture readings from the Catholic Lectionary. Daily readings can be found at usccb.org.

Sunday: "Go and tell John what you hear and see: the blind regain their sight, the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the poor have the good news proclaimed to them." (Mt 11: 4-5)

What miracles, big or small, has God performed in my life?

Monday: "When Jesus had come into the temple area, the chief priests and the elders of the people approached him as he was teaching and said, "By what authority are you doing these things?And who gave you this authority?"" (Mt 21:23)

In what ways do I allow the opinions of others inhibit my joy?

Tuesday: "Thus the total number of generations from Abraham to David is fourteen generations; from David to the Babylonian exile, fourteen generations; from the Babylonian exile to the Christ, fourteen generations." (Mt 1: 17)

When I consider my own family line, what am I proud of? What changes do I want to make to increase the joy of my future generations?

Wednesday: "Behold, the virgin shall be with child and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel, which means "God is with us." (Mt 1:23).

Joseph's news of the birth of his son probably carried mixed emotions. What in my life these days causes me both heartache and joy?

Thursday: "Your wife Elizabeth will bear you a son, and you shall name him John. And you will have joy and gladness" (Lk 1:13)

When has the unexpected caused me joy?

Friday: "And behold, Elizabeth, your relative, has also conceived a son in her old age, and this is the sixth month for her who was called barren; for nothing will be impossible for God." (Lk 1: 36-37)

Do I believe that nothing is impossible for God? What do I need to ask for?

Saturday: "For at the moment the sound of your greeting reached my ears, the infant in my womb leaped for joy." (Lk 1: 44)
