I spend a moment quieting myself, inviting the holy Spirit to help me examine my day.

I look back on my day since I woke up. Who or what helped me feel loved today?

I pause in gratitude to celebrate with God these tangible moments of love.

When was it difficult for me to feel loved today?

I ask God for forgiveness for any of my reactions today that might have made others feel unloved.

I look towards the rest of my day (or tomorrow). What do I need from God in order to believe in this love God has for me? What do I need to spread this love to others?

I pause to ask God for what I need.

Lord, as I end this examen, help me to know that you created me for some special purpose. And that there is no one else like me in this world.
